22 OCTOBER

- 1 Jesus talked of people on dying being faced with the consequences of what they have done (or not done) to others. He talked of how individuals react to those who are hungry or thirsty, strangers or without clothing, sick or imprisoned.
- 2 Each day we meet people who are in many different ways - "naked" or "sick" or "imprisoned". Let's reflect as though Jesus himself was speaking the following words, knowing that he said that we are brothers and sisters to one another, and what we do to them we do to Jesus himself:
- 3 I was naked

because my dignity and self-respect were undermined - but you remained constant and faithful. I was stripped of my good name through rumours that were untrue - but you spoke up for me.

I felt diminished and vulnerable - but you restored my confidence and faith.

4 I was sick and tired and downcast
but you brought healing into my life.
I was anxious about my future
but you lifted my spirits,
and your love cast out my fear.
I felt overburdened

- but you shared my difficulties and helped me to carry my cross.

- 5 I felt imprisoned
 by those who judged and sentenced me
 but you accepted me for who I am.
 I felt entrapped by circumstances,
 but you showed me
 that I have control over my own life.
 I was imprisoned
 by hurts and anguish
 - but you helped to ease the pain.

6 Let's pause in silence to think how, in such small ways, we can set about to touch the lives of a few people today.

- The reflection is based on Mt 25³¹⁻⁴⁶ See 20 October for the other half of the text: "hungry", "thirsty", "strangers".
- We may miss some of the elements in the gospel passage of Mt 25³¹⁻⁴⁶. For example, we might miss the significance of the good people asking sincerely "When was it that...?" It has become second-nature to them to promote goodness and respond to the needs of others.
